Full Crosstabs – Likely Voters Only

Methodology Note:

Findings are based on a survey of 1,702 California adult residents, with 60 percent interviewed on cell phones (1,021 interviews) and 40 percent interviewed on landline telephones (681 interviews). Live landline and cell phone interviews were conducted in English and Spanish according to the respondents' preferences. Interviews took an average of 21 minutes to complete. Interviewing took place on weekend days and weekday nights January 22–31, 2017.

These crosstabs are based on a subgroup of 1,107 California adult likely voters. The sampling error, taking design effects from weighting into consideration, is ± 4.1 percent at the 95 percent confidence level for the unweighted sample of 1,107 likely voters. The sampling error for unweighted likely voter subgroups is larger. Sampling error is only one type of error to which surveys are subject. Results may also be affected by factors such as question wording, question order, and survey timing.
