The ACA offers opportunity to expand Medi-Cal program

- Federal law expands eligibility criteria
 - Income up to 138% FPL
 - Single adults with no dependent children
 - All citizens and legal immigrants in US at least 5 years
- Simplifies and streamlines eligibility determination and enrollment processes
- Federal government provides bulk of financing
- Supreme Court decision makes expansion a state option



California is moving forward with expansion

- Governor's January Budget Proposal
 - Outlines two approaches: state-based and county-based
- Legislation passed in Senate and Assembly
- Preparations for Medi-Cal expansion already underway
 - County Low-Income Health Programs
 - Public hospital system investments



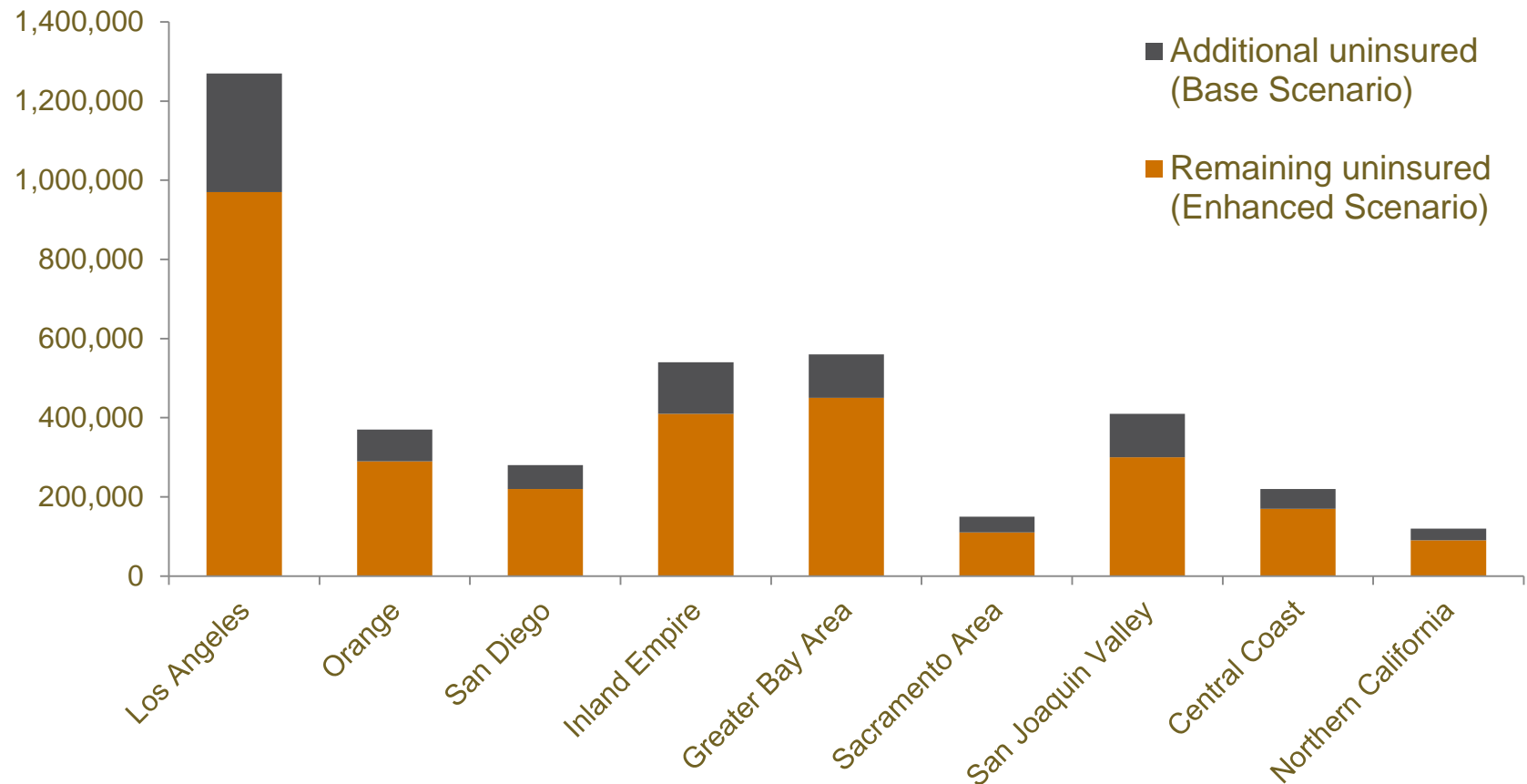
More than a million Californians will become eligible for Medi-Cal

- Over 1.4 million made newly eligible
- Actual enrollment of this group difficult to predict
 - 480,000 to 780,000 projected for 2014
 - 750,000 to 910,000 by 2019
- Increase in enrollment also expected among those currently eligible but not enrolled



But millions of Californians expected to remain uninsured

Estimated uninsured by county and region (2019)

Local-state relationship for serving uninsured will be affected

- County indigent programs currently serve many low-income uninsured residents
 - Under ACA, many likely to shift to Medi-Cal
- State financing for county indigent programs may change
- Counties that operate public hospital and clinic systems particularly impacted



Many questions ahead

- Who will enroll? How healthy will they be?
- What benefits will be available for the newly eligible?
- What will it cost to provide their care?
- Will there be enough providers to serve new Medi-Cal enrollees?
 - Will they be located where needed?
- Who will serve the remaining uninsured?
 - How will that care be financed?
