

# Californians and Their Government — January 2016

## Full Crosstabs – Likely Voters Only

### Methodology Note:

Findings are based on a survey of 1,704 California adult residents, with 50 percent interviewed on landline telephones (852 interviews) and 50 percent interviewed on cell phones (852 interviews). Interviews took an average of 20 minutes to complete. Interviewing took place on weekend days and weekday nights January 10–19, 2016.

These crosstabs are based on a subgroup of 1,043 California adult likely voters. The sampling error, taking design effects from weighting into consideration, is  $\pm 4.4$  percent at the 95 percent confidence level for the unweighted sample of 1,043 likely voters. The sampling error for unweighted likely voter subgroups is larger. Sampling error is only one type of error to which surveys are subject. Results may also be affected by factors such as question wording, question order, and survey timing.
