Full Crosstabs – Likely Voters Only

Methodology Note:

Findings are based on a survey of 1,707 California adult residents, with 75 percent interviewed on cell phones (1,260 interviews) and 25 percent interviewed on landline telephones (447 interviews). Live landline and cell phone interviews were conducted in English and Spanish according to the respondents' preferences. The sample included 512 respondents reached by calling back respondents who had previously completed an interview in PPIC Statewide Surveys in the last six months. Interviews took an average of 18 minutes to complete. Interviewing took place on weekend days and weekday nights January 3-12, 2020.

These crosstabs are based on a subgroup of 967 California adult likely voters. The sampling error, taking design effects from weighting into consideration, is ± 4.6 percent at the 95 percent confidence level for the unweighted sample of 967 likely voters. The sampling error for unweighted likely voter subgroups is larger. For the 530 Democratic Primary likely voters, it is ± 6.5 percent. Sampling error is only one type of error to which surveys are subject. Results may also be affected by factors such as question wording, question order, and survey timing.
