Full Crosstabs – Likely Voters Only

Methodology Note:

Findings are based on a survey of 1,724 California adult residents, conducted online using the SSRS Opinion Panel, along with a supplemental address-based sampling (ABS) sample that allowed respondents to complete the survey online or via telephone. Of the total 1,724 interviews, 1,658 were completed online and 66 interviews were completed over the phone. Interviews were conducted in English and Spanish according to the respondents' preferences. The median time to complete the survey was 20 minutes via web, and 42 minutes via telephone. Interviewing took place from June 7–29, 2023.

These crosstabs are based on a subgroup of 1,092 California adult likely voters. The sampling error, taking design effects from weighting into consideration, is ± 3.8 percent at the 95 percent confidence level for the unweighted sample of 1,092 likely voters. The sampling error for unweighted likely voter subgroups is larger. Sampling error is only one type of error to which surveys are subject. Results may also be affected by factors such as question wording, question order, and survey timing.
