Van Butsic is an assistant cooperative extension specialist and adjunct professor at the University of California, Berkeley, in the Department of Environmental Science, Policy, and Management. He conducts research on land system science, environmental policy, and coupled human and natural systems. He holds a PhD in forestry and an MS in agricultural and applied economics, both from the University of Wisconsin–Madison, and a BA in economics from Reed College.

David Edelson is the Sierra Nevada project director of The Nature Conservancy. He has nearly thirty years of experience promoting ecologically sound management of the Sierra Nevada's national forests. He is responsible for leading all of the conservancy's work in the northern Sierra, including land conservation at iconic sites like Sierra Valley and Carpenter Valley, restoration and research at places like American River Headwaters/French Meadows, and related policy efforts. Prior to joining the conservancy in 2011, he worked for the Natural Resources Defense Council, Sierra Forest Legacy, and the Wilderness Society. An attorney by training, he has a JD from Harvard University, an MA from the California Institute of Integral Studies, and a BA from Dartmouth College.

Barnie Gyant has been the deputy regional forester for resources for the Pacific Southwest Region (Region 5) of the USDA Forest Services since July 2012. In this capacity, he oversees the areas of program development and budget, ecosystems management, ecosystems planning, information management, and tribal relations. The eighteen national forests in California are collectively known as Region 5 of the national forest system. Region 5 also includes responsibility and oversight of state and private forestry in Hawaii and US territories in the Pacific. His previous experience includes deputy director of ecosystem management in Region 5; acting director, ecosystem management; and work assignments as a forest supervisor, deputy forest supervisor, district ranger, deputy district ranger, and resources program manager. Earlier in his career, he worked as a fisheries biologist. He has extensive experience as a line officer and natural resources manager and for the past twenty years has worked on eight different national forests and in four different regions. He earned a bachelor's degree in environmental biology from East Carolina University.

Susie Kocher is a natural resources advisor for the University of California Cooperative Extension in the Central Sierra. She conducts outreach, extension, and applied research on forest management in El Dorado, Amador, Calaveras, and Tuolumne Counties. Her work has focused on pre- and post-fire forest management, development of fire-adapted communities, and public involvement in national forest management. She has held numerous workshops for landowners on forest recovery after fire- and beetle-induced tree mortality and is the author of many extension publications aimed at helping private landowners better manage their forest land. She is a California registered professional forester. She holds an MS in forest resources management from the University of Washington and a BA in anthropology from the University of Iowa.

Jeff Mount is a senior fellow at the PPIC Water Policy Center. He is an emeritus professor at the University of California, Davis, in the Department of Earth and Planetary Sciences and founding director of the Center for Watershed Sciences. A geomorphologist who specializes in the study of rivers, streams, and wetlands, he focuses on integrated water resource management, flood management, and improving aquatic ecosystem health. He has served on many state and federal boards and commissions that address water resource management issues in the West. He has published more than a hundred articles, books, and other publications, including the seminal book *California Rivers and Streams* (UC Press). He holds a PhD and an MS in earth sciences from the University of California, Santa Cruz.
